Additional Information for walkers using the OS Explorer map routes

N62/11: The most serious omission is the footpath from the bottom of Sandilands Close eastward towards Hartgill Farm.

N62/25: They also omit the path from High Bridge farm to Stour Provost, but, since this is not really part of the East Stour network, it isn't worth worrying about.

N62/24: The path from 0.75 km down Witch Lane towards the village hall, has been impassable for many years. However, the stile on Witch Lane is still used by the unofficial branch of the path from the top of Hunger Hill across to Witch Lane.

N62/6: The path from the farm shop SSE to the junction of Scotchey Lane and the "Millennium Avenue" has been deliberately blocked on the Stour Provost side of the parish boundary. However, the bridge across the boundary ditch has been restored and a farm gate 100 metres to the east of the path gives access to the path to Duncliffe Wood.

N62/5: The path from the bottom of Fern Hill on the A30, SSE to middle nowhere can no longer cross the parish boundary ditch, due to disuse and neglect.

N62/7: The official route of this footpath from the farm shop, through Manor Farm yard is less than completely safe and should be avoided. It's much better to go through the fieldgate south of the farm shop, then roughly SSW to the second fieldgate, and through that to rejoin the official line of the path. The footbridge across the parish boundary towards Scotchey Lane is still usable with care.

N62/14: The path from the top of Hunger Hill north towards Majeston has moved to a fieldgate about 60 metres west of the official line. Through that gate, you need to turn sharply ENE to rejoin the official path; if you keep straight on, then that non-public path will lead you further astray into Standpitts Lane.

N62/3: Much of this one-time lane south from the A30, more or less opposite Pennymoor Pitt Farm, is blocked by bog, blackthorn, and brambles and the path therefore runs along the side of the field about 15 metres to the east of its official line.

N62/26: This is the bridle path along the parish boundary up the side of Duncliffe Wood. Overhanging branches have moved the bridle path further out into the field, but the footpath has moved inside the wood and outside East Stour parish.
